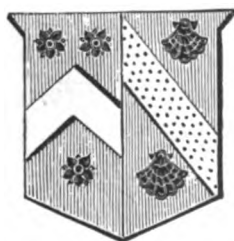

Robert Pitt. *fil.* 5 May, 1702 (*fil.* Thomæ Pitt de Londin., arm. æt. 17). *℥.fil.* received as *℥.* 13 April, 1702, restored by Bursar Baker.

Robert Pitt, son of T. Pitt, became a Master in Chancery.

Humphry Howorth. *fil.* 13 May, 1702 (*fil.* Edvardi Howorth de Caballin, Radn., arm. æt. 17). *℥.fil.* received as *℥.* 12 May, 1702 taken up to pay Battels by Bursar Girdler.

John Fox. *fil.* 13 May, 1702 (*fil.* J. F. de Whiston Stafford., pleb. æt. 16). *℥.fil.* received as Servitor 2 July, restored 6 Nov. —. B.A. (New Inn Hall) 14 Feb. 1705.

James Bond. *fil.* 21 May, 1702 (*fil.* Johannis Bond de Earth, Cornub., arm. æt. 18). *℥.fil.* received as *℥.* 23 April, 1702, restored 6 April, 1704.

Clement Wakelin. *fil.* 5 June, 1702 (*fil.* C. W. de Londin., gen. æt. 16). *℥.fil.* received as *℥.* 2 July, 1702, taken up by Robt. Thistlethwayte to discharge part of the turnover of 1707 on 12 Aug. 1722. B.A. 28 June, 1706.

Caleb Cook. *fil.* 11 June, 1702 (*fil.* C. C. de Milbourn Port, Dorcestr. cler. æt. 18). *℥.fil.* received as Servitor, 2 July 1702, restored 26 Oct. —. B.A. (All Souls), May 9, 1706.

Thomas Eyans. *fil.* 11 June, 1702 (*fil.* Antonii Eyans de Bagbrook, Oxon, gen. æt. 16). *℥.fil.* received as *℥.* 23 June, 1702 restored by Bursar Eyans. Admitted *£.* 1703. Goodridge Exhibitioner, 1704, 1705. Apparently he remained *£.* till 1707. B.A. 22 April, 1706.

Brother of John Eyans 1688.

Richard Saunders. *fil.* 15 Oct. 1702 (*fil.* R. S. de Ather-ton, Warwic, cler. æt. 17). B.A. (St. Mary Hall) 4 July, 1706.

ABBREVIATIONS.

IN a work of this kind it is unnecessary to explain the ordinary contractions of University records, but the following observations must be noted.

The letters **f.** and **S.** must be read Fellow or Fellowship, Scholar or Scholarship.

P. Probationer Fellow.

f. C. Fellow Commoner.

C. Commoner.

B. Batellar.

M. Matriculated.

C.M. Caution Money.

Goodridge Exhibitions. Four Commoners and three Scholars were chosen *annually* to receive these.

s.p. sine prole; *s.p.m.* sine prole mascula.

v.p. vita patris.

Register A is the Founder's Register.

B is the Commoner's Register.

C stands for the Caution Books.

D stands for the Bursars' Accounts.

M stands for the Minutes in the Convention Books.

O.H.S. refers to the publications of the Oxford Historical Society.

With regard to dates, it must be remembered that, according to the Old Style, the year began on 25th March; so that for the first three months of a year a double date is often used: while sometimes the entries were made according to the Old Style, and sometimes according to the New. These irregularities have been carefully observed. When ? is attached to a date, it is a conjecture of the Editor's.

Similarly the names of places have been printed as written; sometimes strange names like Autre (*i.e.* Ottery), Sebaru (*i.e.* Seaburrow), have been successfully identified; sometimes a conjecture is offered (with ?); but frequently the name remains obscure. It must be remembered that these names were taken down by a Bedell from the lips of an uncouth boy who pronounced in his county dialect, and often gave the name of a hamlet or manor as his native place, all trace of which has since disappeared from maps and records.
