An inventory of Queen Anne of Denmark's 'ornaments, furniture, householde stuffe, and other parcells' at Denmark House, 1619

When Anne of Denmark, Queen of England, died on 2 March 1619, James I commissioned a series of inventories of all her 'jewells, precious Stones, Ornaments, Houseldholdstuffe, Implements, and other Goods and Chattels'. The inventory, which is here transcribed, lists the items in Denmark House (otherwise Somerset House) in the spring or summer of 1619. Copies of this inventory were subsequently attached to grants of Denmark House to Anne's son Charles, Prince of Wales and are preserved in the Duchy of Cornwall Office.

THE inventory of the contents of Denmark House (better known as Somerset House), which forms the subject of this study, was commissioned by King James I on 19 April 1619, nearly seven weeks after the death of Queen Anne of Denmark Anne's body was at that time lying in state at Denmark House, her burial in Westminster Abbey delayed while means were found to finance it on a scale befitting a Queen of England and while the courtiers argued about ceremonial precedence.¹ The funeral did not take place until 13 May. It is likely, therefore, that the inventory team was at work while the Queen's embalmed corpse lay in one of the state rooms, watched over by the ladies of the court. John Chamberlain remarked on the level of activity about the palace even while the official mourning continued² It is noticeable that, after a trawl of the wardrobes, sited probably on the lower floors, they removed first to the eastern wing of Denmark House where the 'crosse gallery', the 'roome beyond ye said Crosse Gallery' and the 'little roome betweene ye two galleries' could be examined at a distance from and without disturbance to the main pageant of court mourning. The team then moved generally westwards and southwards through the building. When it came to the 'presence Chamber' and the 'great Chamber' there were only tapestries to be noted. Where exactly the Queen's body lay is not clear, but, to accommodate the imposing catafalque, the swathes of black drapery, and the array of heraldic pomp,

most stateroom furniture had probably been removed, not to be returned until after the period of official mourning was brought to a close at the end of May.

Queen Anne died at Hampton Court on the morning of 2 March 1610, aged forty-four.³ Three days later she was eviscerated there and found to be 'much wasted within, specially her liver as yt were quite consumed' ⁴ Her 'bowelles and inwarde parts' were placed in a 'greate vessell' made by Abraham Greene, serjeant plumber, and removed by her servants to Westminster Abbey where they were buried in Henry VII's chapel. Greene 'intombed' the body with 'lead and soder'.⁵ Clement Chapman prepared two coffins, one for use at Hampton Court and the other for Denmark House.⁶ On 9 March the Queen's remains were carried by night along the Thames to her London residence, where they were set in state.7 There being no chapel at Denmark House at that time, the hearse was erected in one of the staterooms.

Denmark House, as Somerset House, had been granted to Anne as dower on James's accession to the throne of England in 1603. Its new name had been in informal use for some time before it was officially sanctioned in 1617 in honour of Anne and her brother, Christian IV, King of Denmark. It became her favourite residence. Extensive rebuilding, including remodelled staterooms and a new east wing, was carried out between 1609 and 1612,⁸ and Anne made it a centre of London society and culture. Here, after her death, her body lay for over nine weeks, before its funeral journey to Westminster Abbey, 'a drawling tedious sight' according to Chamberlain.⁹ James, who had a fear of death and disease and attended neither at her deathbed nor at Denmark House, was absent also from her funeral, preferring to remain at Greenwich, to which he had transferred from Theobalds in Hertfordshire two days before. His absence was ascribed to a 'fit of the stones'.¹⁰

It was customary for the royal deceased, while lying in state, to be visibly represented by an effigy, made of wood, metal, plaster and other materials, displayed on the top of the coffin within the structure of the hearse. The painted wooden bust of Queen Anne's funeral effigy has survived at Westminster Abbey, taken there as part of the funeral cortege. A witness to the event described the effigy crowned, robed and sceptred, laid out on the coffin as it was conveyed by carriage from Denmark House to the Abbey.¹¹

The effigy of Anne was made by Maximilian Colt, the King's master-sculptor, who was also responsible for the Denmark House hearse.¹² A drawing by Colt of a hearse for Anne shows an octagonal arrangement, canopied and pillared, rich with banners, guidons and escutcheons and with sentinel beasts and wild men. Inside it, the crowned and robed effigy of the Queen is recumbent, her head on a crimson cushion.¹³ Whether this was the hearse that was present in Denmark House as the 1619 inventory was being taken is not clear. During the period of delay another hearse stood ready in Westminster Abbey, admired by Chamberlain as 'the fairest and stateliest that I thincke was ever seene there' ¹⁴ It has been suggested that Inigo Jones might have designed the Abbey hearse, since a surviving drawing by him depicts a rectangular catafalque classically ornamented with cupids, carvatids and decorative panels, with the figure of a Queen, not lying but seated, within it. Jones's conceit is perhaps statelier than Colt's, but accommodates none of the heraldic embellishments that almost certainly would have been insisted upon and its implementation must be open to doubt.15

The cost of the interment and ceremonial on which James insisted was considerable. Nathaniel Brent estimated $f_{,40,000}$;¹⁶ John Chamberlain thought it might be three times the cost of Queen Elizabeth's funeral.¹⁷ The money to dress all royal servants in mourning,¹⁸ to make monumental cata-falques, to pay the fees of heralds, craftsmen and musicians, and to deck out the procession and the Abbey with funereal grandeur, was not easily raised by a straitened king; and Sir Lionel Cranfield, Master of the King's Wardrobe, who oversaw the arrangements, was not one to proceed without secure financial cover

James was therefore greatly exercised in the spring of 1619 about revenue. In times of financial embarrassment jewels and plate could be disposed of to advantage - sold for cash, used as gifts that would otherwise have to be bought or (as Anne had occasionally done and her son Charles was to do more often) pawned.¹⁹ In the accumulation of jewellery Anne had always been voracious. Apart from some personal items, most of it was treated as Crown property and monitored by lists and inventories made by the King's officials, especially those of the Secret Jewel House at the Tower²⁰ Allocations to Anne, to her household, to her palaces and to particular occasions, such as plate to be used on her progress to Woodstock in 1612²¹ were subject to check.²² Five days before Anne's death, as she lay ill at Hampton Court, James ordered a full 'View Examynation and Accompt' of all available jewellery and plate.²³

The present 'Inventory or booke of remaine of the ornaments furniture householde stuffe and other parcells of the late Queene Anne at Denmarke howse' is not directed to jewellery, but to those articles that would devolve with the house. Few articles are included that might qualify as jewellery 'sixteene paire of beades Chaines and braceletts in a small coffer', a 'Cheyne of Corall in a white box', a number of decorated clocks, looking-glasses and ornaments, some silver-gilt candlesticks and utensils. This was, however, only part of a much more comprehensive commission given on 19 April 1619 to the Earls of Worcester and Pembroke, Lord Digby, Sir Robert Naunton, Sir Edward Coke, Sir Lionel Cranfield and Sir Fulke Greville, namely to 'make perfect Books Inventories and Schedules of all such Jewells, precious Stones, Ornaments, Householdstuffe, Implements, and other Goods and Chattels, as did thentofore belong to our late Deare Consorte Queen Anne in her Lyfe tyme, with their Names, Fashions, Qualities and Values'.²⁴ No such 'values' are given in any of the Duchy of Cornwall copies of the inventory. Either the articles described were never regarded by the commissioners as realizable assets and were simply never evaluated; or the copies represent an abbreviated form, made in the autumn of 1619, of that part of the commissioners' original report of April or May that related to Denmark House. Either might explain why the entries are on the whole more limited than descriptions of the same items in the inventory for the sale of Charles I's goods in 1649.

According to Chamberlain, on 12 May, the day before Anne's funeral, 'the Quenes trunckes and cabinets with jewells were brought [to the King at Greenwich] from Denmarke House in fowre carts, and delivered by inventorie by Sir Edward Cooke and auditor Gofton the King perused them all'.²⁵ Sir Francis Gofton, auditor of the Exchequer, was not one of the Commissioners, but he was one of the signatories of the 'house contents' inventory and perhaps had executive charge of the enterprise. By the end of May 1619 the audit of Anne's jewellery had been fully enough discharged for her French manservant Piero and her Dutch maid Anna to be 'clapt up' for the alleged embezzlement of gems to the value of £30,000.²⁶

On 2 July 1619, his review of Anne's possessions completed, James instructed his commissioners²⁷ to assign the choicest jewellery, precious stones and ornaments to his Secret Jewel House, others to the custody of Sir Henry Knight, his Master of Jewels and Plate, some were to be reserved as presents for foreign ambassadors 'to save the Expence of our Treasure', and others to be kept at Denmark House 'for Ornaments there'. Those of little value and 'not fit to be preserved for our Use or Service' were to be carefully inventoried and sold off, their estimated value being £20,000 'or thereabouts'. With regard to the 'Apparell, Robbes and other Furniture of our late Deere Consort, as weare by her used and worne in her Lyfe tyme, and are not nowe meete to be by Us kepte and preserved, We are pleased, and by these Present doe requier and geve Power and Authoritie unto you our said Commissioners, or anie three or more of you as aforesaid, amongest suche Ladies and others as served or attended uppon our said late Consort, in such a manner as you in your Wisdomes shall thinke meete'.

The commissioners were further ordered, on 10 August, to sell off remaining inventoried items of Queen Anne that were inferior, damaged or soiled, including 'divers loose and ragged Pearles, some parcelles of Silver Plate, together with broken pieces and endes of Gould and Silver, Lynnen which hath beene muche worne, Cabinetts, Remnantes of Stoffes of sondry kinds, olde Roabes and Garmentes of former Queenes of this Realme', and to pass all receipts to the Exchequer.²⁸

Anne left no will, and the distribution of her considerable estate was the subject of much speculation, with Prince Charles, Anne's daughter Elizabeth, wife of the Elector Palatine, and Christian IV of Denmark, Anne's brother, figuring among the suggested beneficiaries. The King's favourite, George Villiers, Marquis of Buckingham, was in the event to share amply in the spoils with gifts of jewellery and land There was an early report that he was also to be the new Keeper of Denmark House but the office was given instead to his elder brother John, Viscount Purbeck.²⁹ When the King was satisfied with his commissioners' sales and disposals, the bulk of the estate passed to Charles. A grant of 28 September 1610 confirmed what was already generally known, that Charles was to receive, inter alia, 'Denmark House, and divers small tenements in the Strand thereto belonging, together with certain household stuffe and furniture, as expressed in schedules' A copy of the present inventory was therefore attached to the grant.³⁰

In her study of the inventories made in 1600 of the clothes and jewellery of Queen Elizabeth in the royal wardrobes at Whitehall, the Tower and Blackfriars, Janet Arnold remarked on the absence from her lists of those garments once belonging to Henry VIII that surfaced in the sale inventories for the goods of Charles I in 1649.31 One might have expected them to be kept at the Tower alongside the old clothing of Edward VI and Queen Mary. The 1619 inventory for Denmark House locates 'in another roome', 'in ye warderobe', 'in ye warderobe of bedds' and 'in the roome beyond the little beddchamber' the St Michael robes, coats, cassocks, shirts and embroidered borders of Henry VIII, from which it seems reasonable to assume that these items were, curiously, already stored at Somerset House in 1600.³²

The modest count of clothing in Denmark House in 1619, a paltry wardrobe for a Queen who loved fashion and finery, may be taken to represent the permanent stock in the palace, for Anne had this time come there only after her death with no need for further supplies from the principal storehouses. It may also reflect some prompt dispersal, by gift or by pilfering, of many articles.³³

The making of an inventory was a not uncommon occurrence in the royal household. There would often be in existence, therefore, earlier lists against which the current articles could be checked That the auditors cataloguing the possessions of Charles I which were to be offered for sale in 1649 were making use of earlier inventories seems clear from numerous instances of identical wording common to both 1619 and 1649; for example, 'a small looking glasse sett in silver guilte and enamelled wth a woman in the foote and two peces of mother of perle in the bottome a christall button in the topp wth a perle in a black guilt leather Case'³⁴ or 'a gally of Christall standing upon fower wheeles garnished wth perles and Rubies silver guilte wth Images and Ordinunce in a Crimsen Velvett case wthin a black leather Box'.35 Altered conditions must be recorded by gualifications and ommissions: by 1649 a cover for a 'lookinge Glasse of Ebony inlaid wth mother of perle' had been lost, 'a lookinge glasse in a frame of white satten embrodered' was 'broaken', and a number of cushions, waistcoats, brass skillets, fire shovels and such items had disappeared Both the similarities and the differences are informative. We discover that the 1640 'Greene vellvett Carpett with the Queenes Lres enbroydered in the middst, and att the 4^{or} Corners, and freindgd about with a gould freindge' was not an introduction for Queen Henrietta Maria, as might be supposed, but was already in the house in 1610.³⁶ Several chests in the wardrobes appear to have been left virtually undisturbed for thirty years

In general more detailed information is given in 1649 than in the Duchy's copies of the 1619 Denmark House inventory. A 1619 'small prospective of Criste Mary & Martha' is identified in 1649 as being by Steenwyck. The 1619 'larg Square carpet of needle worke silke silver and gold wth Sea fish and Shippes' is elaborated in 1649 to 'One very rich Carpett of Needleworke of gould silver and silke wrought very Curiosly with the Sea and all sorts of Fishes, and Shipps in ye same, all in waves, and having in it ye Firmament, and all kinds of Landworke with Fowle and Beasts wrought therein, The Border of it freindgd with Gould silver and greene silke lyned with greene Buckerome Cont 2 yds $\frac{1}{2}$ in length, & 2 yds $\frac{1}{2}$ in breadth'.³⁷ But occasionally we get more details in 1619 than in 1649 Thus, the portmanteau 1649 entry 'Nyne Coates all of them enb'rd' abbreviates a more descriptive list of surviving Henry VIII garments given in 1619 ³⁸

The inventory provides a picture of the furniture and furnishings of Denmark House in 1619, seen largely as room-by-room settings, allowing for rearrangements necessitated by the lying in state. Whether it is the House in May, still in mourning, after the Queen's jewellery and plate had been carted away, or in the autumn to which some items had perhaps been returned on the King's orders of 11 July, is not clear

Though few of Anne's paintings are described in any detail, there is considerable evidence here for her artistic taste, soon to be substantially superseded by the collecting preferences of her son Charles. There is much to complement the information derived from the Oatlands inventories made during the years 1611–18;³⁹ and there is much more than those royal pictures noticed at Denmark House by the visiting Duke of Saxe-Weimar in 1613.⁴⁰ The small selection of books kept by Anne at Denmark House (covering theology, history and beauty care), the whereabouts of tapestries in royal palaces, the upkeep and use of old garments and many other aspects of a royal household are subjects on which the following pages may well throw interesting light.

The manuscripts

Three copies of the inventory of Anne of Denmark's household goods are held by the Duchy of Cornwall Office (DCO). The original inventory, now lost, was commissioned by King James I on 19 April 1619, and compiled during the weeks that followed The commissioners' findings were subsequently incorporated into documents recording the grant of the House to Anne's son Charles, Prince of Wales and Duke of Cornwall, in October 1619.

Inrollments of Patents etc., Prince Charles, 1618–20, fols. 69– 98v The second volume of a series of three contains an inrolled copy of the inventory, presumably, in the light of the introductory wording, taken directly from the original commissioned in April (although possibly in an abbreviated form) It is this copy that provides the text that follows Alongside the volume's foliation, the folios containing the copy of the inventory have themselves been separately numbered 1–30, suggesting discrete origins They follow immediately the inrolment of the grant for life of the Office of Keeper of Denmark House to John, Viscount Purbeck on 11 November 1619 This copy of the inventory may have been made after, perhaps as a consequence of, the grant Alternatively, if made earlier, it may have been inserted here on Purbeck's assumption of the office There is no other material in the volume appertaining to the grant The volume, measuring 198 mm \times 124 mm was rebound in the twentieth century One watermark, the crowned arms of Burgundy and Austria with the Golden Fleece beneath, occurs throughout the volume⁴¹

Charters 13 The grant of Denmark House by James I to Prince Charles made on 5 October 1619 at Westminster under the Privy Seal, contains a copy of the inventory entitled 'An Inventory of such Household stuff, Furniture and other ornaments remayning in Denmark house as are hereby graunted to the Prince' Except for this title there is no significant difference from the wording of copy 1 The inventory is given on seven large vellum sheets attached to the foot of the grant.

DCO *Miscellaneous*, vol 1, fols. 39–66. This volume of miscellaneous material contains a transcript of copy 1 made by Richard Gray, Deputy Auditor of the Duchy of Cornwall, in or about 1793 There are in the volume other transcripts by Gray, some of which are so dated As Deputy Auditor, Gray had the keeping of the Duchy records, stored in the newly built Duchy offices at Somerset House⁴²
